NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY CAMPUSES

Nottingham Academy is a very large organisation with capacity for 3780 pupils. It is one of a small number of all-through 3-19 schools in the country with its own Nursery, Primary, Secondary and Sixth Form provision.

Nottingham Academy is comprised of 3 campuses. Greenwood Campus includes our Primary Campus and serves the Sneinton and Bakersfield areas and Ransom Road Campus serves the Mapperley and St Anns areas. Nottingham Academy also admits pupils from across Nottingham where places and pupil proximity allows.

Greenwood Campus

Greenwood Campus Site 1 on Greenwood Road provides provision for pupils from Nursery through to Year 3 and Year 9 to Sixth Form.

Greenwood Campus Site 2 has a Primary building for Years 4 to Year 6 and a Secondary building for Year 7 and Year 8.



Ransom Road Campus

The Ransom Road Campus on Ransom Drive provides provision for Year 7 through to Year 11, with a dedicated Year 7 and 8 base on site.

Although operating across these three sites, the dedicated team of Academy staff, Primary phase, Secondary phase and those working in the Sixth Form Centre, work closely together to ensure Nottingham Academy pupils thrive both academically and pastorally.

ACHIEVING THE VISION

Education on a smaller scale

Nottingham Academy is a large organisation, with a wealth of specialist support staff in all areas. This means we can provide outstanding bespoke support for each individual pupil.

The move from a smaller primary school to a larger organisation can be daunting for pupils. We recognise that pupils and parents want to feel safe and secure and we achieve this by setting up 'bases', or 'schools within a school'.

OUR VISION

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KEY STAGE 3

On entry, Year 7 and 8 pupils are located in their own area of the Academy at our Ransom Road Campus and on their own site (Site 2) of the Greenwood Campus.



We have developed a bespoke, project based Key Stage 3 Curriculum designed to support accelerated progress through the transition to secondary school. Pupils study English, mathematics and modern foreign languages as well as the new cross-curricular subject areas of discover, create and perform. The new subject areas provide pupils with the opportunity to explore subjects in a deeper more coherent way. Our innovative KS3 curriculum is driven by a focus on the development of literacy and oracy skills and promotes an ethos of ambition, challenge, academic rigour and achievement. In mixed ability teaching groups, the curriculum will provide opportunities for KS3 pupils to develop a range of learning characteristics.

KEY STAGE 4

As part of our continued commitment to improve educational outcomes for all pupils at Nottingham Academy we have extended Key Stage 4 to three years. This provides extra lesson time to better prepare our pupils for the additional content, skills and demands of the new KS4 curriculum and GCSE examinations. The extra time will also ensure pupils develop a greater depth of understanding, improve subject-specific skills and enhance examination preparation.

At KS4, pupils are able to select some of the courses they wish to pursue. Teaching staff support pupils and their families in making GCSE choices or 'options'. They will continue with key subjects from earlier years but will also be able to choose new/optional courses, typically including GCSEs and high quality vocational subjects.

NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY SIXTH FORM CENTRE



We recognise that older students have different needs and we have an established and enhanced Post-16 provision at our Greenwood Campus.

Our Sixth Form Centre offers students aged 16-19 a range of academic and vocational courses with excellent tutorial support and careers guidance available. Students leave Nottingham Academy Sixth Form fully prepared for university, training or future employment.

The Sixth Form Centre at the Nottingham Academy is at an exciting new stage of development.

Our brand new sixth form centre reopened on our Greenwood Campus in September 2016, with modern facilities for group or individual study.

PASTORAL SUPPORT

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At Nottingham Academy we ensure that each individual pupil is supported and we have developed an efficient and caring system of pastoral care. We aim to support students academically, personally and emotionally. Our pastoral system is structured in such a way to enable us to offer targeted support effectively and in a timely manner.

Each year group is divided up into tutor groups. Each of these groups is in the charge of a form tutor, who plays a major role in the academic progress and social welfare of each child in the group. The form tutor has extensive knowledge of each pupil in the group and parents are

asked to make contact with him or her in the first instance if any problems or questions arise involving their child. Form tutors are led by Heads of Year, whose responsibility is to co-ordinate and support the work of form tutors and to oversee the academic and social progress of the year as a whole.

We have a large team of support staff. Directors of Achievement and Learning Mentors work with the Heads of Year to provide exceptional levels of support for pupils from Key Stage 3 and through GCSE and A level years, to ensure examination success.

SAFEGUARDING

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Nottingham Academy and the GAT (Greenwood Academies Trust) take their responsibilities to safeguard the welfare of children, young people and adults very seriously and all staff, no matter what their role, are committed to the policies and procedures to ensure all individuals are kept safe, free from harm and have their needs and welfare promoted at all times. This includes the welfare of colleagues and those who have any role to play in the life of the Academy.

LEARNING SUPPORT

Here at Nottingham Academy, we promote an inclusive educational environment; the Academy has well-staffed and well equipped Learning Support Departments. Their role is to support pupils who are experiencing learning difficulties and to help extend the most able pupils to ensure they reach their full potential. We also have Learning Mentors employed throughout the Academy. The support offered may take place in the child's lessons or may be on a withdrawal basis. For pupils who speak English as an additional language we have specialist staff who coordinate the work of these pupils in all years of the Academy.

The transition from primary to secondary education can be a difficult time; therefore we develop plans to ensure our pupils are well prepared for this move. We work closely with our feeder primary schools to ensure we have a thorough understanding of the individual needs of each of our pupils on entry and for some pupils we offer a bespoke programme to help them have a smooth transition.

Once at the Academy, we provide a range of strategies including:

- support through the classroom or through withdrawal
- pastoral care through both the year team and our SEND department
- a curriculum catering for each child's needs
- tailored reading and literacy intervention

BEHAVIOUR FOR LEARNING

At Nottingham Academy our expectations for student conduct are clear and our standards exceedingly high. A full code of conduct can be found on our website, please take time to discuss this with your child and familiarise yourself with this document. We support our young people to conduct themselves in a positive manner: to be respectful of themselves, each other and their environment. We demand that the behaviour demonstrated in lessons enhances the learning experience for all and that our pupils contribute fully to the life of the Academy.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

At Nottingham Academy we expect our pupils to attend the Academy ready to learn, on time, every day. This obligation ensures pupils have the greatest opportunity to achieve and to go on to future success. We reward pupils who achieve 100% attendance, and our attendance team work hard to support those who are not meeting this standard.

Recognising positive behaviours and contributions

At Nottingham Academy we recognise and celebrate the hard work and achievements of our students. We reward effort, contribution, progress and achievement, consideration for others, good manners, community spirit and those students that go the extra mile to be exceptional ambassadors for the Academy. Celebration assemblies are held regularly in each year group, where rewards are given to selected pupils. These rewards can range from shopping vouchers to theme park days out.

Addressing poor behaviour

At Nottingham Academy we work diligently to help students behave well. We intervene quickly when things go wrong. When behaviour for learning is below the level we expect, our dedicated teaching staff intervene and are effectively supported by expert pastoral teams and experienced senior leaders. To resolve issues, we involve parents and carers at the earliest opportunity and are committed to working in partnership.

Poor behaviour and defiance will not be tolerated and the Academy uses a range of support measures and sanctions to prevent this happening including but not limited to exiting pupils from class, detentions, isolations and when necessary exclusions.

UNIFORM AND PRESENTATION

At Nottingham Academy we believe that wearing our distinctive uniform gives our pupils a sense of belonging and helps to foster pride in the Academy.

Our pupils are our ambassadors in the community, therefore, we expect pupils to wear full uniform when travelling to and from the Academy, at all Academy functions, on extra-curricular visits and when taking part in sports events.



UNIFORM FOR YEARS 7 AND 8

- Academy tie with a traditional white shirt.
- Black trousers or skirt, tight-fitting trousers and skirts are not appropriate. Skirts should be no shorter than knee length.
- Academy jumper, in purple, with the Academy logo.
- Black or grey socks with black trousers, neutral or black tights with skirts.
- Black leather or leather-style shoes with a flat sole and a heel no more than 2cm in height. No boots, trainers, or trainer-style shoes.

Some pupils may wish to wear a salwar kameez, in purple. This is acceptable; the kameez must be knee length. Hijabs should be black, grey or purple.

Pupils are expected to carry a suitable, dark-coloured rucksack-type bag which is large enough to carry all equipment.

To aid in the creation of a professional learning environment, we insist pupils only wear one pair of small gold or silver stud earrings in the lobes of their ears. Nose studs and other facial jewellery are not acceptable. Retainers and stretchers of any kind are not permitted. Nail varnish and make-up are not allowed. For their own safety and that of fellow pupils we ask that girls do not wear acrylic nails on the Academy site.

Hair styles should not be excessive and should have a natural colour/ tone. Exaggerated cuts of any shape or design are not acceptable.

Electrical items, such as mobile phones or iPods should not be seen or used on the Academy site.

The Principal's decision about all uniform and presentation issues is binding and final.

The Academy takes no responsibility for lost or stolen jewellery or electrical items as they are not allowed on the Academy site.

Physical education kit for all years:

- Plain black tracksuit bottoms, leggings or shorts
- black short-sleeved sports polo shirt with purple panels and the Academy logo
- black long-sleeved reversible sports shirt with purple panels and the Academy logo
- suitable trainers or other sports footwear

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

At Nottingham Academy we aim to develop all aspects of pupils' wider education by providing a broad programme of extended opportunities. We encourage all students to take an active part in our extensive range of extra-curricular activities, which run every day at lunchtime and after school.

Sport A range of sports are on offer, including competitive fixtures and leisure activities using our impressive facilities. Sports include football, hockey, netball and rugby. Nottingham Academy Basketball Academy also provides pupils with the opportunity to train and play basketball, supported by our high quality coaching team.

Performing Arts We have a significant expressive arts offer. This includes opportunities in music (including free tuition), dance and drama. Throughout the year pupils are encouraged to take part in productions and concerts.

Visits Pupils have the opportunity to attend many visits, both curriculum based activities and educational trips.

Residentials We have a very successful Duke of Edinburgh scheme and provide many opportunities for pupils to take part in Outward Bound experiences.



CAREERS AND EMPLOYABILITY

Nottingham Academy fully understands the importance of providing young people with opportunities to develop employability skills and ensuring that they are fully supported to make informed choices about the next stage in their education, employment or training. Our aim for all of our young people is that they go on to lead happy, successful and fulfilling careers in the future.

Nottingham Academy have links with many of Nottingham's large businesses such as Experian, Ikano and Capital One this enables us to provide mentoring experiences and workplace learning from as early as year 7. We believe this fosters ambition and aspiration, enthusing pupils about careers as soon as they begin their Academy life.

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ADMISSIONS

Pupils are admitted at the start of, and during, our four main stages:

- Nursery (ages 3 - 5)
- Primary reception (age 5)
- Secondary year 7 (age 11)
- Secondary post-16 (age 16)

Pupils on roll in the primary part of the Academy have an automatic place in the secondary part of the Academy.

Admission Numbers:

- a) 180 part time or 150 full time places - nursery
- b) 150 full time places - reception
- c) 420* full time places - year 7 (including 90 pupils automatically transferring from the Academy's primary provision)
- d) 300 full time places – post 16 (including all year 11 pupils at the Academy who choose to stay on and meet the entry requirements for Nottingham Academy Sixth Form Centre)

TO APPLY FOR A PLACE AT NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY

For admission to our nursery provision parents should contact the Primary Reception on our Greenwood Campus site on 0115 748 3385 to apply for a place.

For admission to primary reception and to secondary year 7, in the year preceding admission, parents should apply using Nottingham City Council's Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme.

NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY ADVISORY COUNCIL
