Task 3: Understanding the need for specialised exchange surfaces

Q: Explain why single celled organisms can survive using diffusion alone?

Task 4: Understanding biodiversity investigations

Plan an investigation to quantify species of biodiversity of; plants affected by change in altitude and on a slope.
