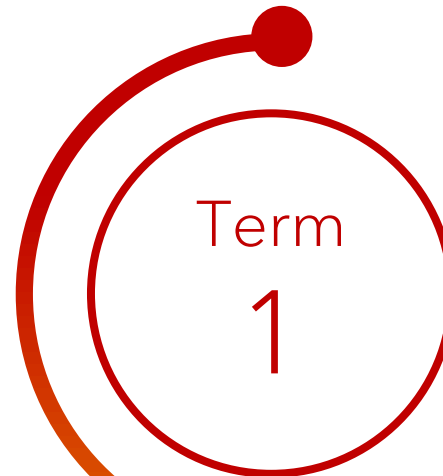
Campaigns for Change and Theories of Criminality (Units 1 & 2)

Students will compare various crime-related campaigns and analyze their effectiveness. They will plan and create their own campaign for change. In Unit 2, students will study biological, individualistic, and sociological theories of crime, applying them to real-life cases. They will assess how these theories influence policy and discuss the impact of social changes and campaigns on policy-making.

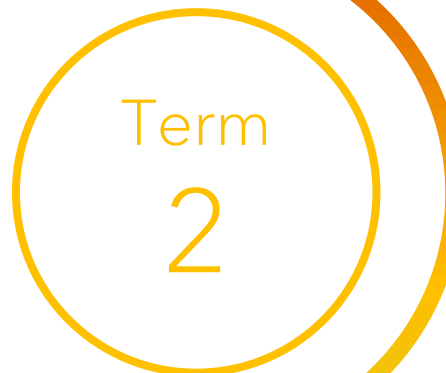

Introduction to Criminology and Changing Awareness of Crime (Units 1 & 2)

Students will explore different types of crime and why some crimes go unreported. They will learn about the impact of unreported crimes and how crime is shown in the media. Students will also evaluate how crime statistics are collected. In addition, they will compare criminal behavior and deviance and understand how society defines criminality.
